

## -ERE verbs



- The part of the verb that ends in -ere is called the infinitive.
- In English, the infinitive starts with the word "to", followed by the name of the verb.
- ere verbs are the third conjugation, or group, of Latin verbs.
  - The -ere group of verbs is the second biggest group.

regere	to rule			
reg <mark>ō</mark>	I rule			
reg <mark>is</mark>	you rule (one person)			
reg <mark>it</mark>	he / she rules			
reg <mark>imus</mark>	we rule			
regi <mark>tis</mark>	you rule (more than one person)			
reg <mark>unt</mark>	they rule			

To make the part of the verb that you need, chop off the -ere to make the stem, then add the right ending.

coquere to cook
scribere to write
verrere to sweep
